# MUNICIPAL FEE FOR STATE POLICE COVERAGE OF LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES



House Bill 959

2019-20 Legislative Session

#### INTRODUCTION

House Bill 959 would require municipalities to pay a fee if the Pennsylvania State Police (PSP) provides their full-time local municipal police patrol services.

Nearly 22 percent of Pennsylvania's population relies solely on PSP for local patrol services without paying anything other than what we all pay through state taxes. The other nearly 80 percent of the population funds their own local police forces through local taxes in addition to paying state taxes for PSP without receiving PSP patrol services.

PSP reports it spends half of its time and budget providing full-time police coverage to the approximately 2 million people without a local police force.

Providing the funding for subsidized police coverage in these areas has been contentious. In 2016, PSP received \$802 million from the Motor License Fund (MLF), more than half of PSP's annual budget that fiscal year—money that was supposed to fund road and bridge maintenance.

Fortunately, the amount of funding PSP can now receive from the MLF is capped to ensure more MLF dollars go to their originally intended purpose of road and bridge maintenance.

However, that means PSP now needs a sustainable revenue source to maintain its current level of services. Asking 80 percent of the population to pay for police services for the other 20 percent simply cannot continue.


PSP estimates it costs \$234 per person to patrol areas without local police coverage.


House Bill 959 would implement a fee that helps cover that cost, giving municipalities a bargain rate for patrol services and providing a steady revenue stream for the PSP.

## PSP COVERAGE -VS- BUDGET

### Where is PSP's Time and Money Spent?





While the PSP provides full-time police coverage to approximately 22% of the population (left), their budget breakdown shows that the cost to patrol these areas accounts for 50% of their annual budget (right).

#### **ABOUT THE BILL**

House Bill 959 would assess a fee on municipalities where the PSP provides full-time local policing services. The fee would be assessed to the municipality on a per capita basis according to the most recent decennial census population, excluding the institutionalized population in State Corrections Institutions. Distressed Municipalities and those in Act 47 status are exempt from paying the fee.

The fee schedule is set on a sliding scale ranging from \$8.00 per capita for a municipality with a population up to 2,000, to \$166 per capita for municipalities with a population over 20,000. During its first year, the fee would raise an estimated \$104 million for PSP operations, services and cadet classes. Any fee increases would occur annually, based the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers (CPI-U) for the Philadelphia-Camden-Wilmington, PA-NJ-DE-MD

area. If the CPI-U does not increase, neither would the fee.

The legislation would become effective immediately and invoices would be sent to municipalities no later than December 1 after the law is enacted. Payments would be due to the Commonwealth no later than April 1 after receiving the invoice. Rates, including any changes in fees, would be posted in the PA Bulletin prior to becoming effective.

Municipalities are granted the authority to adopt ordinances to allow for the collection of fees. However, although the fee would be assessed by the Commonwealth on a per capita basis, a municipality cannot generate revenue for this fee on a per capita basis. A municipality that does not pay the fee for PSP services could be subject to interest payments or having funding, including Liquid Fuel Tax monies, withheld.

#### AN ACT

- 1 Imposing a fee on municipalities for services provided by the 2 Pennsylvania State Police; and providing for allocation of
- funds and for penalties.
- 4 The General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania
- 5 hereby enacts as follows:
- 6 Section 1. Short title.
- 7 This act shall be known and may be cited as the Pennsylvania
- 8 State Police Municipal Police Services Support Act.
- 9 Section 2. Definitions.
- 10 The following words and phrases when used in this act shall
- 11 have the meanings given to them in this section unless the
- 12 context clearly indicates otherwise:
- "Commissioner." The Commissioner of the Pennsylvania State
- 14 Police.
- 15 "Municipality." A county, city, borough, incorporated town,
- 16 township or home rule municipality.

- 1 "State Police services." The provision of primary police
- 2 services by the Pennsylvania State Police to a municipality.
- 3 Section 3. State Police services fee.
- 4 (a) General rule. -- A municipality that receives full-time
- 5 State Police services shall pay an annual per-resident fee to
- 6 the Commonwealth as provided under subsection (b).
- 7 (b) Amount.--
- 8 (1) The fee shall be calculated as follows for each
- 9 person residing in the municipality:
- 10 (i) For a municipality with a population of 1 to
- 2,000, the fee is \$8 per person.
- 12 (ii) For a municipality with a population of 2,001
- to 3,000, the fee is \$17 per person.
- 14 (iii) For a municipality with a population of 3,001
- 15 to 4,000, the fee is \$25 per person.
- 16 (iv) For a municipality with a population of 4,001
- 17 to 5,000, the fee is \$33 per person.
- 18 (v) For a municipality with a population of 5,001 to
- 19 6,000, the fee is \$42 per person.
- 20 (vi) For a municipality with a population of 6,001
- to 7,000, the fee is \$50 per person.
- (vii) For a municipality with a population of 7,001
- 23 to 8,000, the fee is \$58 per person.
- 24 (viii) For a municipality with a population of 8,001
- 25 to 9,000, the fee is \$66 per person.
- 26 (ix) For a municipality with a population of 9,001
- 27 to 10,000, the fee is \$75 per person.

- 11 to 17,000, the fee is \$133 per person.

- 13 17,001 to 18,000, the fee is \$141 per person.
- 14 (xviii) For a municipality with a population of
- 15 18,001 to 19,000, the fee is \$149 per person.
- 16 (xix) For a municipality with a population of 19,001
- 17 to 20,000, the fee is \$158 per person.
- 18 (xx) For a municipality with a population of more
- 19 than 20,000, the fee is \$166 per person.
- 20 (2) For the purposes of this act, the number of
- 21 residents of each municipality shall be the population of the
- 22 municipality reported in the most recent Federal decennial
- census. Any individuals residing in a State correctional
- 24 facility situated within a municipality shall not be
- residents of that municipality for purposes of this act.
- 26 (3) Effective July 1 of the year immediately following
- the effective date of this subsection and each July 1
- thereafter, each fee under paragraph (1) shall be increased
- annually by an amount calculated by applying the percentage
- increase, if any, in the Consumer Price Index for All Urban

- 1 Consumers (CPI-U) for the Philadelphia-Camden-Wilmington, PA-
- 2 NJ-DE-MD area for the most recent 12-month period for which
- 3 figures have been officially reported by the United States
- 4 Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, immediately
- 5 prior to each July 1 to the then-current fees. The Office of
- 6 the Budget shall annually determine the percentage increase
- 7 and the amount of each new fee, and the Secretary of the
- 8 Budget shall publish such percentage increases and amounts in
- 9 the Pennsylvania Bulletin no later than June 1 of each year.
- 10 (c) Determination and payment. -- By December 1, 2019, and by
- 11 December 1 of each year thereafter, the Commonwealth shall send
- 12 an invoice to each municipality stating the payment due from the
- 13 municipality calculated in accordance with subsection (b). Each
- 14 municipality which receives an invoice shall pay the amount due
- 15 to the Commonwealth no later than April 1, 2020, and no later
- 16 than each April 1 thereafter.
- 17 (d) Guidelines. -- The Pennsylvania State Police may adopt and
- 18 use guidelines to implement the provisions of this act. The
- 19 guidelines shall be published in the Pennsylvania Bulletin but
- 20 shall not be subject to review under section 205 of the act of
- 21 July 31, 1968 (P.L.769, No.240), referred to as the Commonwealth
- 22 Documents Law, sections 204(b) and 301(10) of the act of October
- 23 15, 1980 (P.L.950, No.164), known as the Commonwealth Attorneys
- 24 Act, or the act of June 25, 1982 (P.L.633, No.181), known as the
- 25 Regulatory Review Act.
- 26 Section 4. Municipality fees.
- Notwithstanding any other provision of law, a municipality
- 28 may enact an ordinance that imposes and collects a fee at a rate
- 29 sufficient to enable the municipality to pay the fee required by
- 30 this act. No tax, fee or other assessment imposed may be levied

- 1 by a municipality on a per capita basis for the purpose of
- 2 funding the fees under this act.
- 3 Section 5. Deposit of fee payments.
- 4 Money collected under this act shall augment the Pennsylvania
- 5 State Police general government operations appropriation from
- 6 the General Fund in the fiscal year in which the money is
- 7 received and shall be used by the Pennsylvania State Police to
- 8 support Pennsylvania State Police cadet classes and to provide
- 9 Pennsylvania State Police services.
- 10 Section 6. Distressed municipalities.
- 11 Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, a
- 12 municipality that is determined to be distressed under the act
- 13 of July 10, 1987 (P.L.246, No.47), known as the Municipalities
- 14 Financial Recovery Act, shall not be subject to the requirements
- 15 of this act. A municipality that was once determined to be
- 16 distressed under the Municipalities Financial Recovery Act, but
- 17 is not currently determined to be distressed by the Department
- 18 of Community and Economic Development, shall be subject to the
- 19 requirements of this act.
- 20 Section 7. Penalties.
- 21 The Commonwealth reserves the right to calculate the payment
- 22 due from a municipality under this act, or to offset any
- 23 payments of State money due a municipality, including liquid
- 24 fuel tax payments, or both, if the municipality fails to comply
- 25 with the requirements of this act.
- 26 Section 8. Effective date.
- 27 This act shall take effect immediately.
