

Fighting For Our Children







I introduced legislation calling for emergency funding to get asbestos, lead and other toxins out of our schools. I'm working hard on this issue because I've heard too many heartbreaking stories from educators and students in my district, like Daisy Rios and Kane Esasta:

"Daisy, who has gone to Southwark from kindergarten to eighth grade, had to go to school for years with paint chipping off the walls that could poison her. She feels unsafe, as if the adults who let this situation continue don't care about her. Last year, the lead was finally stabilized. But other big problems continue. In the winter, students sometimes get nose bleeds, nausea, and anxiety because the heating doesn't just warm up them up, it leaves them feeling as if they're roasting. Given those conditions, students can't focus and it's hard for educators to focus as well. Daisy told me she eventually wants to study law at Temple University, and she shouldn't have to put her health at risk to get there.

Kane is a Furness senior who will study pre-physical therapy at Cheyney University in the fall. He described that there's lead and asbestos in the building. He said there are bathrooms with no locks or lights and with broken sinks. During hotter months, teachers in classes without air-conditioning must share classrooms that have A/C. That has meant two full classes literally sharing one room while teachers speak about two different topics at the same time. Kane poignantly asked, "How do the adults expect us to stay in school and learn under these oppressive conditions?"

Because of our work to make children's lives a budget priority, the Governor just announced that he's committed to getting over \$1 billion to schools to do emergency repairs. I will keep fighting to make sure schools in our district get this much needed funding.

Net Neutrality Keeps the Internet Free and Open

We expect the company that provides our internet service will transmit data, not manipulate it. But the rules that ensured this protection – net neutrality – have been removed at the federal level. This has big implications: the company that provides your internet could block you from accessing websites for competing companies, stop speech that criticizes the company, even block access to union sites during a labor conflict.

That is why I have introduced HB 544, which would make it illegal for ISPs to block lawful internet content, selectively slow internet traffic or use paid prioritization to squeeze more money from consumers.

Strengthening Patient Protections

Right now, medical students are allowed to perform pelvic, rectal, and prostate exams on patients under anesthesia for training purposes without getting explicit, informed consent. This is unacceptable.

That's why I've introduced HB2246 to ensure medical institutions receive specific consent from patients for these exams performed under anesthesia by medical students or solely for training purposes.



OUR FIRST YEAR IN OFFICE



You are important to us! We're working hard to meet your needs in our District Office and with our Mobile Office Hours across South Philly!

This year we processed 286 new SEPTA ID cards for seniors and assisted 640 people with the Property Tax Rebate process.

We now host monthly federal-level services and, starting last fall, have facilitated the delivery of monthly food boxes to about 100 low-income neighbors.
