COVID-19 Vaccination Info

I continue to work closely with our area's health systems, small pharmacies, and the Pennsylvania Department of Health to coordinate increased vaccine supply.

I take part in regular meetings with state health officials and my colleagues to stay up to date and do all I can to get these much-needed vaccines to our county.

Please know that I share your frustration in this process, and I am doing all I can to improve our current situation. I will also pass along updated information as I receive it on my social media accounts.

On March 3, state health officials announced that teachers and other school personnel will be vaccinated using the Johnson & Johnson single-dose COVID-19 vaccine. What this means is that there won't be a further strain on existing systems or take away from the current vaccine supply.

Our community intermediate units are reaching out to private and public schools and establishing vaccination sites.

The Pennsylvania National Guard and AMI Expeditionary Healthcare will administer the vaccine.

Davis introduces legislation to help communities and people navigate the COVID-19 vaccine, support health care workers

Central registry for COVID-19 vaccine is needed

My office has been inundated with questions and requests for help from people seeking the COVID-19 vaccine. News stories have been rife with the frustrations over the state's rollout of the COVID-19 vaccine, and limited supplies are not helping matters.

Please know that I am doing all that I can to help, which is why I have introduced a bill with several of my colleagues that would set up a central registry for the vaccinations.

The bill would let patients register themselves and their families, provide proof of eligibility for a risk category and list how far they are willing to travel for it. Likewise, vaccine providers would have to register to access the database and set up appointments for those on the list.

If everyone had one place to go to get on the list for a vaccination, it would reduce frustration and make the process that much easier and smoother for all. It's just the right thing to do.

Helping health care workers

Over the past year, COVID-19 has claimed hundreds of thousands of lives and is expected to claim many, many more. In response to this crisis, health care workers all across the state and country have stepped up to take care of those in need, putting their health and life on the line every day to save the lives of our loved ones.

I think we need to step up and do everything we can to take care of them. For this reason, I have introduced two bills to help:

- One bill would establish much-needed supports and protections for frontline health care workers, many of whom are working long hours under extreme stress and personal hardship.
- The second would create a child care grant program for frontline health care workers to ensure they are able to afford high-quality child care as they work to save lives.

Helping ensure nursing homes are safe

Many of us rely on nursing homes to care for our loved ones when the type of care they need is beyond our own abilities. We deserve to know that those nursing homes to which we entrust our family members are addressing and resolving any issues.

I have introduced a bill that would require nursing homes to report data to our state's Patient Safety Authority, which is a national leader on tracking incidents and helping medical facilities become safer for patients. This is something that PSA already does for hospitals, ambulatory surgical facilities and birth centers, and it makes sense to include nursing homes.

Doing this would give the authority and the state Health Department a much clearer picture of how nursing homes can improve and protect the health and safety of our most vulnerable.

Drop boxes available for Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program

During this pandemic, I understand that people may want to limit their contact with others. That's why drop boxes are now available at each of my offices to help eligible homeowners or renters apply for a rebate on property taxes or rent paid in 2020.

Eligible applicants can drop off their documentation of paid property taxes in 2020, a completed rent certificate or rent rebate report, along with all 2020 income information inside an envelope with their name, address and phone number. Everything will be mailed back to applicants once the rebate form is completed.
