POLICY HEARING ON TRAIN DERAILMENT

In March, I joined my colleagues for a bipartisan House Policy Committee hearing in Beaver County, not far from where the Norfolk Southern train carrying hazardous materials derailed in East Palestine, Ohio. We heard testimony from local and state officials about the response to the disaster and the impact on nearby Pennsylvania communities.

This hearing opened an important dialogue about railroad safety issues, pursuing answers about long-term environmental and health impacts and our commitment to help the families who live near the disaster area.

We will not let our guard down. I remain committed to working with my colleagues on long-term monitoring and other investments needed to ensure residents' safety,



supporting emergency personnel who respond to disasters like this and assessing what we can do in Harrisburg to hold those responsible accountable.

HELPING VETERANS RECEIVE FULL BENEFITS FROM KEY STATE PROGRAMS

I believe that every Pennsylvania veteran is entitled to receive the full extent of benefits from important commonwealth programs. Some of those programs consider veterans' disability benefits as income, which reduces the amount of support veterans can claim. I introduced House Bill 363 to exclude veterans' disability benefits from the definition of income for all commonwealth programs, including the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program, PACE/ PACENET and others.

The House unanimously passed the bill, which now awaits consideration in the Senate. We should do everything we can to care for our brave veterans, and this bill is a step toward getting them the full benefits they so richly deserve.




INFRASTRUCTURE, TRANSPORTATION SAFETY & ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

- \$1 million to construct the East Pittsburgh Municipal Facility, which would be more centrally located to most residents and house all borough services in the same building.
- \$1 million for the Allegheny Petroleum Expansion in Wilmerding Borough, which includes improvements to the company's building and manufacturing capabilities.
- \$697,830 to repair sections of Pitcairn's sanitary sewer system.
- \$500,000 to relocate Naser Road in North Versailles Township to address safety concerns due to an increase in traffic and accidents.
- \$341,000 for access improvements at the Forbes Hospital Campus in Monroeville.
- \$250,000 to purchase a building and vacant land and demolish five buildings to assist in the Plum Creek Shoppes economic development project.

- \$200,000 for Turtle Creek Valley Council of Governments to address the demolition of several structures in Pitcairn and Wall, playground renovations in Turtle Creek and street reconstruction in Wilmerding.
- \$140,000 to acquire the property at Parkway Jewish Center in Monroeville to build an emergency access road to the Sri Venkateswara Temple from South McCully Drive to Princeton Drive.
- \$100,000 to rehabilitate Maple Avenue from Grant Street to Oak Avenue Ext. to improve safety for drivers and pedestrians in Turtle Creek Borough.
- \$100,000 to repave and reconstruct critical infrastructure in Wilmerding Borough along Caldwell, Westinghouse and Marguerite avenues and Patton and Commerce streets.
- \$50,000 to rehabilitate and stabilize the hill along Patterson Street in Wall Borough.





I spoke at the ribbon-cutting ceremony at Westinghouse Castle, which was built in the 1800s and will reopen as a multi-purpose facility to serve the Wilmerding community.

OUTDOOR, RECREATIONAL & COMMUNITY SPACES

- \$2 million for renovations and improvements to the Jewish Community Center's Monroeville Family Park facility.
- \$521,000 to acquire 96 acres of land within Monroeville that can be used for open space and passive recreation.
- \$350,000 to help the Monroeville Baseball & Softball Association improve the infrastructure, facilities and resources at Monroeville Community Park West Baseball and Softball Complex.
- \$200,000 to correct uncontrolled stormwater runoff onto the Wilmerding Community Center and its parking lot located in the Ice Plant Hill area of East McKeesport.
- \$150,000 to revitalize the Crestas Terrace Community Center in North Versailles Township.
- \$121,931 to expand the sports complex in Pitcairn.
- \$24,000 to replace the flooring at Monroeville Senior Center's fitness area and install athletic rubber flooring.

IMPACTED BY THE END OF EXTRA SNAP PAYMENTS?

The extra Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Emergency Allotment payments that were issued during the COVID-19 pandemic ended earlier this year due to a change in federal law. Households now receive one regular SNAP payment each month.

To ensure you are receiving the SNAP benefits you are entitled to, you should report any changes to your address, household size, income or expenses to DHS by calling 877-395-8930 or visiting dhs. pa.gov/SNAPCares.

If your household has been impacted by the reduction in SNAP benefits, I want you to know that local food banks and multiple programs are available to help with access to nutritious food. Learn more about assistance programs and resources at www.agriculture.pa.gov/food_security.

APPLYING FOR PROPERTY TAX/RENT REBATES? MY OFFICE CAN HELP!

The Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program provides a state rebate on property taxes or rent paid in 2022 to income-eligible residents 65 or older, widows and widowers 50 or older, and people with disabilities 18 or older.

Applications can be submitted online at www.mypath.pa.gov. My office can also help you obtain a paper application and fill it out. The deadline to apply is June 30, 2023.

PRESCRIPTION DRUG ASSISTANCE

The PACENET program can help income-eligible seniors 65 or older with the costs of prescription medicine. Income limits have recently increased and are now \$33,500 for single people and \$41,500 for married people. To learn more, visit www.aging.pa.gov and scroll down to the link titled PACE Program.
