Helping Seniors: Expanding The Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program

After 17 years, the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program is expanding, thanks to a new law I voted for. The changes will benefit nearly 175,000 more people, including 16,500 seniors in Allegheny County. This year, existing qualifiers might see their rebates double! Key changes:

- Homeowners' income cap increases from \$35,000 to \$45,000.
- Renters' income cap jumps from \$15,000 to \$45,000.
- Maximum rebate increases from \$650 to \$1,000.
- Income cap will automatically adjust for inflation starting in 2024.

I'm proud to have supported this much-needed expansion, helping to ensure our community members can stay in their homes. This program is for eligible seniors 65+; widows/widowers

50-64 years of age; and those who are permanently disabled. If your application is approved, rebate checks are mailed or directly deposited beginning July 1. Looking After Working Families by Expanding the Child Care Tax Credit



I joined my colleagues in the Pennsylvania General Assembly and Governor Josh Shapiro to increase the state Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit to help working families access and afford quality care.

- The credit of \$180 for one child increases to as much as \$1,050.
- The credit of \$360 for two or more children increases to as much as \$2,100.

Working Families in Pennsylvania can now match 100% of the federal Child and Dependent Care Tax Credit, which means nearly 250,000 families in Pennsylvania will have more money in their pockets.

This extra funding will help parents with one of their biggest burdens: paying for childcare. It will also help families afford safe and dependable care for family members who are unable to take care of themselves. If you're eligible, you will receive the money after filing your 2023 tax return.

Prioritizing affordable child and dependent care is a win for families, the workforce, businesses, and the economy.

Joe Delivers With The Democrats

Every day, I am committed to ensuring better jobs, better schools and better communities for every person in Pennsylvania.

I believe in the work that I am doing alongside my colleagues in the Pennsylvania House Democratic Caucus. Together, we are sending over to the Senate dozens of public safety, health care and equity-focused bills that will make our state a better place to live. I want to provide a snapshot of the many ways we are working to move our state forward.

Making Our Communities Safer

Together with my colleagues, we came up with a package that would increase **Police**, **Volunteer Firefighter** and **EMS Recruitment** in our communities. This package would give additional money to recruitment, provide for tax breaks for public safety employees and volunteers, and create training that will de-escalate situations without the use of force

We also passed **Commonsense Gun Safety Bills** that would create Extreme Risk Protection Orders (ERPOs) to prevent firearm suicides, mass shootings, and domestic violence homicides and also include Universal Background Checks to stop weapons of war from getting into the wrong hands by closing a gap in PA's system that allows long guns to be privately purchased or transferred without a background check.

Fighting for Workers

In addition to increasing the Childcare Tax Credit by approximately 300%, I am standing alongside House Democrats as we Fight for Working Families by investing in good jobs and protecting employees while they're on the job.

My colleagues and I have successfully passed legislation to provide OSHA protections for public employees and tackle the issue of Worker Misclassification. With bipartisan support, we also passed a bill in the House that would provide a cost-of-living increase to the PSERS retirement system.

For too long, working families – especially blue-collar workers – have been ignored in the legislature. But, when House Democrats took over, we began working to **level the playing field** among employers and employees.

Supporting Women's Health

Pennsylvania became the first state in the nation to pass a law requiring insurers to provide **Free Preventative Breast Cancer** Screenings for high-risk individuals. I supported this landmark legislation because breast cancer impacts countless families across our Commonwealth.

Protecting a **Woman's Right to Choose** was why I voted in favor of commonsense legislation like a "shield bill" guarding women who receive reproductive healthcare in our state, as well as the practitioners who provide the care, from enforcement of other states' anti-choice laws. All women should be able to make decisions about their bodies, regardless of where they live.

In all, the House Democratic majority advanced more than 200 bills in 2023 – an overwhelming amount with bipartisan support, but we are waiting for the PA Senate to join us in getting them to the Governor's desk. In 2024, I pledge to continue to put people over politics and work with my colleagues to advance legislation to improve public safety, help Pennsylvanians live healthier lives, and make communities fair and equitable for everyone.

Funding Our Schools

Our schools are finally getting the attention they deserve. As your representative, I voted yes on the 2023-24 state spending plan because it invests wisely in public education. The \$45 billion plan includes a record \$567 million increase in basic education funding – the largest we've ever seen in the state's history.

What's more, the new budget also allocates \$46.5 million to provide free school breakfast to students across the state. This means that no student will have to start their day on an empty stomach. Here at home, all our school districts are set to receive across-the-board increases in basic and special education funding. Take a look at the figures:

Basic + special education funding totals under 2023-24 budget and increase from last year:

- Penn Hills School District: \$25.2 million in new funding \$1.8 million increase.
- Plum School District: \$17.3 million in new funding \$755,288 increase.
- Riverview School District: \$4.4 million in new funding \$189,815 increase.

I'm proud to fight -- and win -- to fund our schools.

In addition to public education, the new budget also strengthens resources for public safety and violence prevention and continues funding for important programs benefitting working families and seniors, all without adding any new tax burden on residents.

Apply For Home Heating Help



Applications are now open for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program. The program helps families living on low incomes pay their heating bills in the form of a cash grant that does not need to be repaid. Investing In Our Community

Here are the grants I advocated for and secured for our district:

- \$1,100,000 to the municipality of Penn Hills to update technology with the SCADA system in 8 locations throughout the sanitary sewer system, helping to better track our sewage.
- \$70,000 to the municipality of Penn Hills for design of the VOPP (Verona, Oakmont, Penn Hills, Plum Bike Trail) Segment 2 Milltown Park Trail extension.
- \$216,504 to Verona Borough to install sanitary sewer lines along Center Avenue, Spring Street, Parker Street, Second Street, and Third Street.
- \$423,702 to Oakmont Borough for sanitary sewer improvements.
- \$113,006 to the municipality of Penn Hills for upgrades to the Lincoln Road Water Pollution Control Plant (LRWPCP).
- \$1,300,000 to Oakmont Water Authority to assist in the upgrade of the chlorine disinfection system.
- \$4,100,000 to Allegheny Valley Railroad on infrastructure improvements.
- \$2,100,000 to Union Railroad for improvements at the Bessemer Railyard.
- \$1,500,000 to Oakmont Borough for improvements to the Oakmont Treatment Plant.
- \$20,000 to Penn Hills Community Development Corp. to develop a Preservation Management Plan for the Allegheny River Boulevard Historic District.
- \$100,000 to Oakmont Volunteer Fire Department for additional space for their fire department garage, construction to extend the length of the garage to house the new ladder fire engine.
- \$158,625 to Verona Borough for a Department of Public Works vehicle and equipment purchase.
- \$70,000 to Oakmont Borough for pedestrian-crossing improvements at Hulton Road and 9th Street to improve the safety of students on their way to and from 10th Street Elementary School.
- \$250,000 to Plum Borough to assist in economic development by supporting property demolition & development.
- \$85,000 to improve pedestrian crossing on Hulton Road, outside of the Oakmont Country Club.
- \$100,000 for the improvement of signaling and pedestrian crossing on Hulton Road outside of Riverview High School.
- \$30,000 for water runoff projects at Dark Hollow Park.
- \$175,000 towards the paving program for the streets of Verona Borough.
- \$700,000 for Chelsea Building Products Rail Replacement along Ann Street.
- \$30,300 for ADA accessible park planning in Verona Borough.
- \$916,000 to the Plum Municipal Authority to replace the Sardis Road waterline.
