THE 2023-24 STATE BUDGET

In early July, the House passed the state budget for the 2023-24 fiscal year. I voted in favor of H.B. 611 because it makes significant investments in key areas that will benefit Pennsylvanians.

The new budget delivers a historic \$1 billion education investment, with K-12 public education seeing its largest investment to date. Funding also provides universal free breakfast for students in PA's public schools and increases Level Up, the funding initiative shared among the most underfunded school districts in Pennsylvania.

School districts in the 25th Legislative District will receive an approximate increase of more than \$89 million in education funding over last year's state budget. The funding for each school district is as follows:



OTHER HIGHLIGHTS OF THE STATE BUDGET INCLUDE:

- \$50 million in funding for the Whole-Home Repairs
 Program to allow folks to make critical improvements to
 their homes that they wouldn't otherwise be able to afford.
- \$136 million expansion to the Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program to help older Pennsylvanians and those with disabilities stay in their homes.
- \$23.5 million for workforce training and career & technical education.
- \$20 million increase for county mental health funding.

This budget is just the beginning; we still have more work to do. I'll be working with my colleagues in the House to build on these investments for everyone in the 25th Legislative District as well as all Pennsylvanians.



PROPERTY TAX/RENT REBATE EXPANSION

For the first time in 17 years, Pennsylvania is expanding its Property Tax/Rent Rebate Program. The expansion will help nearly 175,000 more Pennsylvanians qualify for PTRR – including about 16,500 seniors right here in Allegheny County – and many of the 400,000 seniors who already qualify will see their rebates nearly double.

STARTING IN 2024, THE NEW LAW:

- Increases the income cap from \$35,000 to \$45,000 for homeowners
- Increases the income cap from \$15,000 to \$45,000 for renters
- Automatically increases the income cap to grow with inflation, beginning in claim year 2024
- Increases the maximum rebate from \$650 to \$1,000

The rebate amounts and income limits will increase proportionally with inflation, so no senior becomes ineligible just because their Social Security payment increased. I am proud to support this long overdue expansion that will help so many folks in our community remain in their homes.

There is still time to apply for a rebate on property taxes or rent paid in 2022. My office can help you apply by the Dec. 31 deadline. Visit us at 4232 Northern Pike, Suite 303 in Monroeville or call 412-856-8284.

TRANSPORTATION FUNDING FOR OUR COMMUNITIES

Over the summer, PennDOT's Green Light-Go program awarded a total of more than \$675,000 to the following projects:

- Municipality of Monroeville \$308,000 for updated signal equipment at Monroeville Boulevard and Northern Pike (SR 2081) Municipal Center.
- Pitcairn Borough \$59,932 for updated signal equipment along Broadway (SR 130).
- Plum Borough \$55,105 for pedestrian upgrades at Hulton Road (SR 2058) and Hulton Road/Coxcomb Hill Road (SR 2082).
- Plum Borough \$252,300 for updated signal equipment at Coxcomb Hill Road (SR 2082) and Ramparts Boulevard.

\$400 MILLION FEDERAL LOAN FOR EOS ENERGY'S TURTLE CREEK FACILITY

The U.S. Department of Energy made a conditional commitment of nearly \$400 million to battery manufacturer Eos Energy to support the company's Project AMAZE at its facility in Turtle Creek.

Project AMAZE – American Made Zinc Energy is a \$500 million expansion program designed to scale annual production to 8 gigawatt hours of clean energy storage production capacity. Eos aims to move to 100% U.S.-sourced material by 2026.

The federal investment will help Eos meet demand for Long Duration Energy Storage and will expand the workforce in the Mon Valley region with about 1,000 green jobs and 50 union construction jobs.

REPLACING STOLEN SNAP BENEFITS

The state Department of Human Services will replace Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits if they were stolen due to electronic fraudulent activity, such as:

- Skimming: The use of electronic equipment to take someone's information without their knowledge.
- Card Cloning: Copying stolen electronic benefits transfer (EBT) information to a new card.
- Phishing scams: When scammers use fraudulent text messages or phone calls to obtain EBT card numbers and PINs to steal SNAP benefits.
- Scamming: Falsely convincing a SNAP recipient to give their EBT and/or personal information to someone else.

DIGITAL ACCESSIBILITY LEGISLATION

The Pennsylvania House of Representatives recently passed my legislation that would increase accessibility to digital content offered by state and local government websites for people with disabilities.

All Pennsylvanians deserve full and equal access to information and services that will improve their lives. House Bill 1479 is a step in ensuring that content online provided by state and local governments is more inclusive and designed to meet the needs of people with disabilities so they can access essential services and information.

The legislation now moves to the Senate for consideration.

Municipal Elections will be held on Nov. 7, 2023. These elections help to shape the future of our neighborhoods, schools and local government. Polls will be open on Election Day from 7 a.m. – 8 p.m. Visit www.vote.pa.gov to find your polling location, update your voter registration, learn about Municipal Elections, or perform any of the following:

- Register to vote (by Oct. 23, 2023)
- Request a mail-in or absentee ballot (by Oct. 31, 2023)

Pennsylvania is now an automatic voter registration state. Eligible voters will be automatically taken through the voter registration process when obtaining or renewing a driver's license or photo ID at a DMV location, unless they choose to opt out of registering.
